Celebrating Catherine's 80th Birthday

Catherine Mamer's call to Peace House Community took the form of an invitation from its founder, Sr. Rose Tillemans. They were together at an arraignment hearing for their participation in an anti-war protest against Honeywell Corporation when Sr. Rose offered the invitation, "Come to Peace House and see what we are about." So Catherine came and knew in an instant that she fit in. The first visit was in 1987. Catherine never left.

When asked what core values she shares with PHC, Catherine does not hesitate: hospitality, compassion, love, and non-judgment. "Here at Peace House, hospitality is all about welcoming people as persons of worth. That means we need to manage our disappointment when relationships hit a bump in the road. Love," Catherine says, "is about keeping the lines of communication open with people no matter what so that they know that someone loves them." Catherine recognized early in her life people needed to experience love in and from a community. "**People,**" she says, "**need a community, and community can only emerge when people understand they belong just as they are.**"
