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DIRECTOR'S CORNER

I'm about to do the thing that fundraising experts say I never should – thank our supporters and ask for more gifts at the same time.

To start, I and everyone at PHC are tremendously thankful for all the support we receive. Everything good that happens at PHC happens because of caring supporters. No matter how much or how little someone is able to give, it provides a safe space for those who desperately need it.

Unfortunately, our community members face a new challenge. Minneapolis is dismantling any homeless camp in the first 48 hours of it being set up. For all the problems the encampments created, they gave people a place to keep their stuff and to receive services from food outreach and other programs. With the City's new approach, more people are losing everyday items like toothbrushes and soap. They aren't receiving the services and supplies that help them survive. That forces them to come to places like PHC. And so, we hosted 15 more community members a day in April than in March. Over the next year, that will add up to an extra 4,000 folks coming through PHC's doors looking for help and support.

As I said, we are thankful for everything we receive from our supporters. Whether you give time, skills, or money, you make a difference to hundreds of people that you will never meet. We thank you for that. But at the same time, I have to ask for a little bit more. No gift is too small to help us meet the crisis that is facing our community. Together, we can make sure that our community members have what they need to make it through the day.
